

Governance and Our Business

Governance

Launceston Police and Community Youth Club Inc is a registered charity and is a constitutional member-based incorporated association overseen by the Board of Management. The Club Manager, employed by the Board, manages the operational aspects of the organisation, reporting to the Board on a monthly basis.

Human Resources

Launceston PCYC employs 2 full time, 9 part-time and 30 casual staff. Of those staff, approximately 50% are aged under 24 years. In addition, the Club engages three external contractors and six regular volunteers to deliver classes.

Finances

The Club's financial situation has continued to improve. 2020/2021 returned a larger surplus due to the Jobkeeper subsidy, however compared to pre covid times, the Club continues to improve its performance, which in turn supports a growth in Youth Development services.

Over the last 12 months the ASCENT program has continued to have a positive effect upon the lives of young women by building resilience and self-esteem, encouraging positive relationships and addressing the contemporary issues facing young people.

The inclusion of challenging recreational activities continues to be integral to the success of the program. In addition to PCYC based activities, such as Archery Tag and Rockwall Climb, abseiling at Brady's Lookout and completion of the High Ropes course at Hollybank are very real challenges for most participants.

With ASCENT running into its fifth year of operation, we are now realising several "success stories" – with some of the young women who participated in our early groups going on to achieve fantastic things – and keeping in touch with us along that journey. With ongoing support from the Merridew Foundation, the ASCENT program continues to build a fantastic reputation with the high schools involved.



Youth Adventure Club

LPCYC's Youth Adventure Club (YAC) is all about getting young people out into nature, enjoying the beautiful scenery and landscapes in which Tasmania has to offer. YAC is an all-inclusive group, for youth aged 13-17 to get together and learn about outdoor recreation activities such as hiking, mountain bike riding and kayaking. Not only do YAC participants learn about the fun side of outdoor recreational activities, but they are also faced with risk assessment activities, developing first aid knowledge, search and rescue missions, and emergency communication techniques.

YAC is designed to equip young people with the knowledge and experience required to act in a safe and responsible manner when undertaking outdoor recreational activities. These skills will assist them in their own personal adventures, career and education pathways and opportunities, and encourage them to utilise their knowledge which they have learnt and apply it to everyday life.



Mobile Activity Centre (MAC)

The Mobile Activity Centre continued to provide strong outreach support to the Launceston community, providing free activity sessions in high-needs areas, particularly in the northern and eastern suburbs, and works very much in partnership with the Northern Suburbs Community Centre, the Starting Point Ravenswood Neighbourhood House, City Mission and the Migrant Resource Centre.

It was evident that 'external' activity providers were a popular commodity, especially after the 2021 school holiday in July and hence, the MAC program flourished during the latter half of the year. Cliental included many local and remote primary and high schools, Reclink Australia, the Northern Suburbs Community Centre, The Cancer Council of Tasmania, Northern Councils, Lions Clubs, the Launceston R.S.L. as well as local community based, home schooling and vacation care groups.

The Taiko Drumming 'arm' of the MAC program at local schools saw the busiest second half of a school year unfold, which saw a staggering 17 performances unfold at many local schools. As is usually the case at this time of the year, some fantastic individual and team based outcomes were achieved.

The MAC program continues to be well received by Northern Tasmania at large, with its provision of relevant, diverse and inclusive activities, for people of all ages and abilities.



Planet Queer - Youth Pride Ball

March 2022 saw the inaugural youth pride ball, Planet Queer held with over 80 youth identifying as LGBTQI+ in attendance. To raise funds for the event and to be able to provide the event free of charge to youth, the volunteer committee held a fundraiser market and car boot sale, approached local, state and federal elected members for donations, and ran a raffle. Thank you to everyone who donated and supported the fundraising efforts, and to Working it Out for their donation.

Pulling together the amazing talent in our community, we would like to especially thank Pussay Poppins, Ana Thema and Hera for their inspirational performances and speeches, and the musical talents of Now We're Apart, and DJ Zoe Saltz. It was a wonderful night and the first of many to come.



Taiko Drumming

The club beginner and performer sessions continued to run, albeit on a much lower scale due to COVID and related issues. As a result, there were far less event performance opportunities for the club's Taiko Oni Jima ensemble, with only two events going ahead as planned. The Deloraine based 'WinterFire' in July and the Launceston Women's 5K Race in September gave the group at least some opportunity to 'shine amid the gloom'. Other planned events prior to the end of the year were cancelled, again due to the COVID and related issues, including work and family commitments.

The 2022 year commenced on a more positive note, with more opportunities possible as COVID restrictions gradually eased. This included events such as 'Faux Mo' in January, a graduation celebration at St Patricks College in April, and Climate Change rally in Launceston in May and final, at the 'Fire & Mountain Winter festival at Burnie, where the group was very well received by the local community.



Gymsports

Gymsports programmes continue to be a vibrant part of what LPCYC offers the Launceston youth, with Rhythmic Gymnastics added in October 2021. Our gymnastics programme now has over 300 athletes, trampoline and tumbling have over 50 in each discipline and Rhythmic has grown to over 20 in just three terms.

Other activities

Launceston PCYC is offers Art and Coding classes to engaged young people not traditionally attracted to active recreation. The progressive classes teach students the fundamentals of their discipline and builds on skills learned in previous classes, with break out workshops each school holiday period.

Each school holiday period, LPCYC offers a diverse and affordable programme catering for children aged from one-year to teenagers and adults. These programmes offer art, craft, cooking, Gymsports, games, social sports, rock climbing, archery tag, as well as various STEM challenges.

Not only do we cater for young people, but also low-cost activities for the entire community including Seniors Fitness, Walking Soccer, Futsal, Tai Chi, Fitness Classes, Personal Training, Karate, Aikido, and the Weights Gym. We would like to extend our gratitude to the selfless volunteers who make many of these programmes possible.

Olympic Weightlifting

In July, the national U15/Youth championships were held albeit as a satellite event) at Hobart. Whilst some travelled from Queensland and Victoria, COVID restrictions held the other states back. The Launceston PCYC had four in the Tasmanian state team, and remarkably, not one lift was missed despite going for PB's and state records. Charlee Adams and Ebony Cooper just missed out on medals, but Jorja Love got a Youth silver medal, and Danica Holloway finished with a well-earned Youth Bronze medal.

Later in July, Mya Venn was the club's sole representative at the state senior championships, again held in Hobart. She lifted well consistently, with the only blemish being her final attempt (trying for a new PB), and was rewarded with the title of State Senior Champion in her weight category. The

Cliff Joyce Memorial competition (a long serving volunteer coach at the Launceston PCYC) was held at Devonport for the first time in late September, where again, the club was well represented. In early December, the final competition of 2021 was held at Hobart, and the annual awards dinner followed, which saw Mya Venn once again receive the state U20 Best Lifter award.

The 2022 year kicked off with the Chris Chugg Memorial in late February, which saw a handful of experience and first time lifters from the club producing some very consistent results. Interestingly, and due largely to COVID and other restrictions, it was the first time in the club's recent history (18 years) that the club did not have at the state U15/17 championship event which was held at Mornington in late April (and hence, none at the national event either). Some earnest recruiting will take place to ensure that this is not the case into the future.
